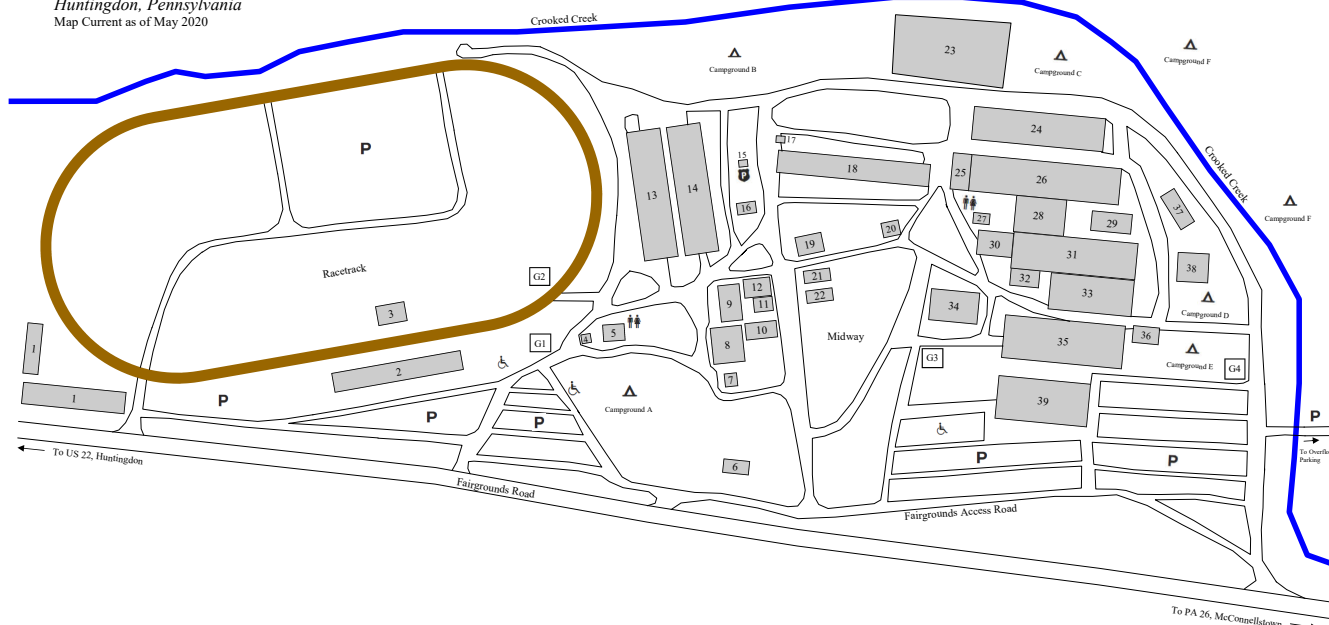

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. How do I enter an exhibit?

Download the premium guide and entry form:

- www.huntingdoncountyfair.com
- Enter online at **entries.huntingdoncountyfair.com**
- Registration deadline is July 1.

2. Where do I go on check-in day?

- **Animal Entries:** Report to the barn where your animals will be penned or stalled. The superintendents will check in your animal. Have your CVI/VCPR and registration papers ready upon animal arrival.
- **Non-animal Entries:** Report to the building where your exhibit will be displayed. Refer to the check-in times and building in the premium guide for your exhibit's department.

3. When can I remove my exhibit?

- Departments' release times are on the schedule of events.
- Exhibitors must present claim tickets to remove exhibits.
- Present claim ticket(s) at the fairgrounds gate the final day of fair from 9-11 a.m. for free admission for exhibit removal.

4. When do I receive my premium check?

- Checks should be available at the Livestock Office after 1 p.m. on Friday of fair week.
- Checks not picked up by 12 p.m. Saturday are mailed.
- Premiums are only paid to the number of placings listed under the class in this publication. Premiums are not paid for champions and reserve champions.

HUNTINGDON COUNTY FAIR RULES FOR FAIR CONDUCT

Rules of conduct shall apply to all who enter the fairgrounds whether vendor, exhibitor, camper, or member of the general public.

Department

- Alcohol and controlled substances are prohibited on the grounds.
- Smoking is prohibited in all buildings on the grounds.
- Extremely loud, objectionable, or vulgar language is prohibited at all times.
- Unsportsmanlike, disruptive, and unethical behavior is prohibited at all times.
- When an exhibitor, parent, guardian, youth leader, coach, agent, or representative acting on behalf of an exhibitor is guilty of unsportsmanlike or unethical conduct the Huntingdon County Agricultural Association (Fair Board) may require the exhibitor to return all trophies and ribbons and may prohibit the exhibitor from participating in any of the exhibitor events for such a period as judged appropriate by the Fair Board. Any of these individuals may also be expelled from the fairgrounds for unsportsmanlike or unethical behavior as judged by the fair board.

Housekeeping Expectations

- Maintain a clean area around your booth, exhibit, camper, or concession.
- Drainage of any liquid from concessions or campers must be disposed of at the dumping station (near grandstand entrance). After the first warning, the Township Enforcement Officer will be called.

Objects PROHIBITED on the grounds

- Motorcycles, bicycles, scooters, or skateboards prohibited inside the gates.
- Dogs and other pets (except service animals)
- Glass containers or bottles
- Camping tents
- Weapons
- Laser pointers, water pistols, cap pistols

Transportation around the grounds

- All vehicles must park in designated areas and have a valid parking pass displayed at all times.
- Golf cart use during the fair is reserved for medical services and fair personnel.
- Physically challenged persons are welcome to use wheelchairs or ADA recognized mechanical wheelchairs or scooters.
- Any exceptions to the above policy must be registered with Director Jim Rowe at the main office.

Hours of Operation

- 11 a.m. – Daily delivery deadline on the grounds.
- 11 p.m. – Curfew. Businesses must close.
- 11:30 p.m. – Unauthorized persons must be off the grounds.

Failure to comply with the rules of conduct may result in eviction from the fairgrounds and/or loss of privileges.



ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS



The Huntingdon County Agricultural Association reserves the right to adopt stricter livestock health regulations than those provided herein which all exhibitors must adhere to prior to and during the fair so as to provide a biosecure environment that protects the agricultural industry of Pennsylvania and conforms to any governmental regulations that may be issued subsequently to the publishing of this annual premium tabloid.

1. Animals, with the exception of swine and Pennsylvania rabbits/cavies, will not be admitted without a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued by a licensed and accredited veterinarian within the **30 days prior** to the date of animal exhibition OR a completed Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR) form with a veterinarian's signature dated **May 1, 2026 or later**. All animals must be individually identified on the CVI or VCPR. The CVI/VCPR must be available upon arrival and with the herdsman in charge at all times throughout the fair. Veterinarians and fair officials may check exhibits daily.
2. A statement indicating all animals are free of infectious and contagious diseases is required on the CVI or VCPR. If this statement is preprinted, a veterinarian must sign the statement. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival will be sent home.
3. No animal showing evidence of contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease will be allowed entrance into the fair. Fair officials reserve the right to disqualify any unthrifty, unhealthy, or undesirable projects.
4. Before importing animals from a state or area which is quarantined to prevent the spread of disease, owners must contact the Department of Agriculture to obtain current regulations regarding imports from that state or area.
5. Veterinarian bills accrued due to ill or injured animals on the fairgrounds will be paid for by the exhibitor, regardless if the exhibitor or fair personnel contact the veterinarian.
6. All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after return to the herd of origin.
7. Out of state animals must have a CVI issued within 30 days prior to the date of importation.
8. See the additional health rules that are specific to your species.

HORSE HEALTH RULES

1. Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) - All horses must be official ELISA or AGID (Coggins) test negative within one year of admission to the show. The negative test report must accompany the horse. The negative test must have been conducted within 12 months of the opening date of the show. The negative test report must be issued to the current owner of all horses, including pulling teams and must include an accurate description of the horse including age, color and sex, plus any other reliable identification such as tattoos, distinctive marks, etc. Solid color animals must be identified by some method of unique identification such as a lip tattoo, brand or at least two (2) distinct markings.
2. Horses should be immunized to prevent contagious respiratory disease (e.g. Equine influenza, EHV and Triple E) not less than 15 days before the show.
3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. Rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a completed rabies vaccination certificate or the information must be on the CVI.

CATTLE HEALTH RULES

1. All cattle must be identified with a 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ISO-compliant RFID ear tag starting with "840" and bearing the US shield. A USDA issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag if permitted if applied prior to Nov.5, 2024. This tag type is no longer valid for interstate movement if applied after Nov. 5, 2024.
2. It is required that all cattle entering the show be currently immunized against IBR, PI3, BVD, and BRSV within the past 12 months. A statement that the animal(s) identified have been immunized against IBR, PI3, BVD, and BRSV must be on the CVI/VCPR. All dairy beef steers need to be vaccinated against Bovine Rhinotracheitis-Virus (IBR), Parainfluenza 3 (PI3), and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (BRSV), with two doses given a minimum of six weeks apart with the final dose administered a minimum of 14 days prior to check in. Both vaccinations must be listed on the CVI/VCPR by the veterinarian.
3. BVD VACCINATIONS: All cattle that have never been vaccinated against BVD or have not been vaccinated against BVD during the previous 12 months, must receive one dose of modified live virus vaccine given at least 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show, or two doses of killed vaccine, two to four weeks apart, with the last dose given at least 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show. Cattle that have been vaccinated against BVD within the previous 12 months must receive at least a single injection of live virus or killed vaccine given not less than 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show. The date of the BVD vaccination(s) must be recorded on the CVI/VCPR.
4. No cattle showing clinical signs of active ringworm, warts, lice or mange will be admitted to any show.
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. Rabies vaccinated animals must be accompanied by a legible, completed rabies vaccination certificate or the information must be on the CVI/VCPR. Market steers (both beef and dairy beef) are exempt from the rabies vaccination requirement.
6. Out of State Cattle - A CVI issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation is required. Current HPAI testing and moving requirements must be followed when moving dairy cattle into Pennsylvania. All of the in state cattle specific requirements apply. For Brucellosis and TB testing requirements, call the Bureau of Animal Health's Regulations and Compliance Division at (717) 783-6851.
7. HPAI testing is not required in cattle. This is subject to change if Pennsylvania confirms a positive HPAI case in cattle.

SHEEP HEALTH RULES

1. Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Identification used for sheep must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official ID includes a USDA ear tag with a US shield, scrapie program tags, or a legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—state postal code and letters/numbers—and individual animal ID in the left ear).
2. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. Rabies vaccinated animals must be accompanied by a completed rabies vaccination certificate or the information must be on the CVI/VCPR. Market lambs showing in the HCF market lamb show are exempt from the rabies vaccination requirement.

GOAT HEALTH RULES

1. Goats must bear an official USDA scrapie identification tag available from USDA at 1-866-873-2824. Goats having a registration tattoo with a registration certificate are exempt from this requirement.
2. No goat showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease including caseous lymphadenitis, sore mouth, active ring worm, foot rot, warts, lice, or mange will be admitted to the show.
3. All goats shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the intrastate transportation of goats found at 7 Pa.Code § 3.151.
4. All goats shall comply with the Department's "General Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4751, September 19, 2020].

SWINE HEALTH RULES

1. Swine must have a CVI issued within the 30 days prior to the date of exhibition.
2. A veterinarian MUST check swine on trailer prior to unloading animals at the fair.
3. Swine must bear an official USDA 840 radio frequency identification (RFID) and the number recorded on the CVI.
4. All swine unloaded off a trailer into the barn/scale must be moved to a PDA or USDA licenced slaughter facility upon completion of the sale or weighin.
5. Pseudorabies and Brucellosis tests are not required.

RABBIT AND CAVY HEALTH RULES

1. An animal owner or caretaker's verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form.
2. Rabbits showing signs of contagious or infectious disease will not be admitted to the fair. Superintendents have the final judgment in resolving any health dispute.
3. The owner of the animal and the place of exhibition or destination shall meet the standards established at sections 2323 and 2327 of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2323 and 2327) and set forth in Subchapter A, paragraphs 9 and 10 of this document.
4. The owner of the animal shall meet all general requirements for importation and intrastate movement as set forth in sections 3.3, 3.4, 3.5, 3.6 and 3.7 of the Department's regulations (7 Pa.Code §§ 3.3-3.7).
5. While on exhibit or at any time following exhibition, it is an obligation to report all mass mortality events and all rabbits who are ill and bleeding from eyes, nose, mouth, or have bloody stools to the Department's emergency line 717-772-2852, option 1. It is vital to quickly identify and prevent dangerous transmissible diseases such as Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) from spreading.
6. Out of State Rabbits: A CVI issued within the 14 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required. The Certificate of Veterinary inspection shall be written by an accredited Veterinarian and contain the following statements: "All Rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases including RHDV-2 and there have not been multiple mortality events or rabbits exhibiting hemorrhages within the last 90 days. The rabbits in this shipment have not been housed or exhibited with any rabbits associated with known mass mortality or hemorrhage events" or "In the last 90 days, the rabbits in this shipment, have not been exhibited in, housed in, or traveled to, any state or territory in which RHDV-2 has been diagnosed within the last 12 months. In addition, during the last 90 days, they have had no contact with any captive or wild rabbit originating from or travelled to one of those affected states or territories."
7. The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania rabbits at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases. While on exhibit, report all mass mortality events and all rabbits who are ill and bleeding from eyes, nose, mouth, or have bloody stools to the department emergency line 717-772-2852 option 1. We need your help to quickly identify and stop dangerous transmissible diseases such as RHDV-2.

LIVESTOCK AND DAIRY GENERAL RULES

Entries

- In all cases the right is reserved to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry or application for entry if stalls or pens are not available.
- Pens and stalls will be assigned based on the number of entries by each exhibitor. These facilities are to be used only to tie or enclose livestock. In the case of animals entered but not exhibited, management may reassign excess pens or stalls.
- Exhibitors housing animals at the fairgrounds prior to and during the fair will be held liable for any disease/sickness transmission or quarantine caused by their animal at the fair.
- Animals must be housed in the stall/pen it is assigned for the week. Management reserves the right to alter pen/stall assignments and will then notify the exhibitor to house the animal at a designated location.
- No animals may enter the fairgrounds before noon Friday.
- All animals must be on the fairgrounds by 7 p.m. Saturday.

Housekeeping

- Livestock trucks/trailers on the fairgrounds during fair week shall be parked under the direction of the Fair Management in the area set aside for such trucks/trailers as soon as unloaded. Limited parking for livestock trucks and/or trailers is available behind Owens Hall. Fees are payable to the fair using the Trailer Entry Form.

Safety

- Do not tie livestock to the show ring bleachers.
- If an animal becomes unruly at any time, fair personnel reserve the right to prohibit the animal from being shown or ask that it be removed from the fair. The judge may request an unruly animal be removed from the show ring.
- Exhibitors are responsible for making sure walkways are clean and accessible to the public at all times.

Welfare

- Transport in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.
- Provide dry, clean bedding. Clean pens regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable.
- Provide animals with feed and clean water regularly.
- Material items such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down. Muzzles on animals are not permitted.
- It is the exhibitor's responsibility to provide proper health care for their animals through frequent inspections daily.
- Unethical or abusive activities with livestock are not allowed.

Exhibition

- Exhibits shall conform to all requests of the management to lead out their animals for exhibition, judging contests or other purposes. Refusal will result in forfeiture of prizes won and such other penalty as the Fair Management may impose.
- No animal will be awarded a prize unless removed from its stall and exhibited at the scheduled time and place.
- Use only grooming products approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it! Any animals with a residue from fitting can be disqualified.
- Any exhibitor found to be showing an animal identified improperly will have the animal removed from the show and sale. All premiums and ribbons must be returned. That individual will not be permitted to show at the Huntingdon County Fair for a minimum of one year in the Open Show and Junior Show.
- ****Important**** The fair reserves the right to pull blood or hair samples or other samples as needed on any animal for DNA confirmation of breed, genetic testing, and drug residue. Animals consigned for slaughter during or immediately following the show shall not receive any treatment with drugs or biologics within the withdrawal time prior to slaughter. Withdrawal times for drugs and biologics are all stated on the directions for use. Label directions must be followed at all times. Unapproved substances are prohibited. If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics, or any chemical from fitting products or other reasons results in the condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor. Any exhibitor who has an animal testing positive for any unapproved substance will have the animal removed from the show and sale. All premiums and ribbons must be returned. That individual will not be permitted to show at the Huntingdon County Fair for a minimum of one year in the Open and Junior Shows.
- Formal complaints must be made to the species of Livestock Superintendents prior to the contest.



CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS



Huntingdon County Fair will abide by the same code of show ring ethics adopted by the Pennsylvania Farm Show as stated below.

THE STATE FARM PRODUCTS SHOW COMMISSION has developed a Code of Show Ring Ethics to curtail unethical, deceptive, and fraudulent show ring practices. The Code is as follows: Exhibitors of animals at the Farm Show shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at the livestock show. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and may be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the Commission. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada. The following list of mandatory rules is for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events.

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any fact relating thereto is prohibited.

2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by show officials.

3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the show.

4. Animals shall be presented to the show or competition event free of unapproved or illegal drug residues. Market animals that will enter the food chain shall only use products that are solely in accordance with the USDA and FDA approved labels and administered according to label instructions of the product being used for the approved species being shown. Product withdrawals shall be in accordance to all labels, with sale day being the last day of the withdrawal period. Animals not entered in an event that culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal and state statutes, regulations, or rules. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show or contest is giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for Show Management to obtain any specimen of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used for testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on Farm Show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any drugs or implants injected or used shall be in accordance with USDA or FDA approved labels. All other surgical procedures, non-USDA or non- FDA approved substances, or illegal injection of any foreign substance or drug, including drenching and pumping of fluids, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hooves or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct interference with the judge, Show Management, other exhibitors and their family members, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, Show Management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, parent, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the Commission for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the Commission may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members. Additionally, the name of those involved with any violations will be sent to all County Extension offices and The State Department of Vocational Agriculture.

11. The act of entering an animal in the show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action that contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal and state statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

4-H MEMBERS & LEADERS

4-H members participating in or attending club, county, regional, district, state, and national programs, activities, events, shows, and contests sponsored for youth by the 4-H Youth development Program of Penn State Extension are required to conduct themselves according to the Pennsylvania 4-H Code of Conduct. The code operates in conjunction with the Pennsylvania 4-H Youth Development Program Behavioral Expectations and the rules and regulations of the specific activity.

Adults attending or participating in 4-H youth activities are expected to conduct themselves according to the code and to assist and support youth in their efforts to adhere to the code.

The following are not permitted at 4-H-sponsored programs, activities, or events:

- Possession, consumption, or distribution of alcohol.
- Possession, use, or distribution of illegal drugs.
- Possession or use of all tobacco products, this includes the use of electronic cigarettes, personal vaporizers, or electronic nicotine delivery systems that simulate tobacco smoking.
- Violence, including, sexual abuse, sexual harassment, physical, verbal, emotional, or mental abuse of another person.
- Sexual activity.
- Boys in girls' rooms and girls in boys' rooms or lodging areas.
- Cheating or misrepresenting project work.
- Theft, destruction, or abuse of property.
- Violation of an established curfew.
- Unauthorized absence from program site.
- Bullying of any kind including verbal, physical, and cyber bullying (social media, texting, snapchat, etc.).
- The inappropriate use of camera, imaging, and digital devices where privacy is expected.
- Unethical or inhumane treatment of animals.
- Possession or use of a weapon. (This does not refer to the equipment used in authorized shooting sports practice or competition.)
- Possession or use of a harmful object with the intent to hurt or intimidate others.
- Public displays of affection are not appropriate.
- Possession or use of fireworks.

FFA CODE OF ETHICS

FFA members conduct themselves at all times to be a credit to their organization, chapter, school, community, and family. As an FFA member, I pledge to:

- Develop my potential for premier leadership, personal growth, and career success.
- Make a positive difference in the lives of others.
- Dress neatly and appropriately for the occasion.
- Respect the rights of others and their property.
- Be courteous, honest, and fair with others.
- Communicate in an appropriate, purposeful, and positive manner.
- Demonstrate good sportsmanship by being modest in winning and generous in defeat.
- Make myself aware of FFA programs and activities and be an active participant.
- Conduct and value a supervised agricultural experience program.
- Strive to establish and enhance my skills through agricultural education in order to enter a successful career.
- Appreciate and promote diversity in our organization.

3. No grade stallions will be accepted for entry.
4. No horses permitted in barn until Saturday, August 8, 2026. Horses are released at 9 a.m. Saturday, August 15, 2026.
5. Registration papers must be presented to the horse committee by 4 p.m. Sunday, August 8, 2026. If registration papers are not shown to the superintendent, the animal will be considered a grade and shown as such.
6. There must be 12 or more entries to receive 5 prize monies. Classes with 11 or fewer entries will receive 3 prize monies.
7. No tack stalls will be provided.
8. Limit three animals per stall.
9. All exhibitors are expected to maintain their animals and stable area in a clean and attractive manner. All stalls must be cleaned by noon. Violation may result in forfeiture of prize monies.
10. Exhibitors are to provide and/or arrange for the care of their animals.
11. No exhibitor will be allowed in the barn from midnight to 6 a.m.
12. All exhibitors will pay a daily admission fee in lieu of an entrance fee.
13. Horses and ponies must be stabled for the entire week in barns designated for show animals. Any animals removed before release time will forfeit premium money.
14. Horses may be ridden in the designated exercise area from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m. Lead horses from the stables to the exercise area.
15. Exhibitors in both halter and performance classes must be residents of Pennsylvania.
16. In breed classes, horses may be shown in one breed only.
17. Horses entered as matched pairs must be owned by one person or farm.
18. Proper number must be displayed for each animal or they will be disqualified.
19. Proper attire must be worn in all classes. Heeled boots must be worn in all riding classes, Western attire for Western classes, English attire for English classes, and Western tack for game classes.
20. No children under 12 years old may handle stallions.
21. Sr. Exhibitors - 18 yrs. and over as of Jan. 1 of current year. Jr. Exhibitors - 13-17 yrs. as of Jan. 1 of current year. Youth exhibitors - 12 yrs. and under as of Jan. 1 of the current year.
22. Any exhibitor not abiding by these regulations will be requested to remove their animals from the fairgrounds and the exhibitor will forfeit any premium money and ribbons awarded.
23. Produce of Dam consists of two animals of the same registration, any age or sex out of one mare regardless of the ownership. Get of Sire consists of two animals of the same registration, any age or sex out of one stallion regardless of the ownership.

1. Enter online at entries.huntingdoncountyfair.com or send completed Dairy Cattle Entry Form to the Fair Office by July 1. Entries received after the deadline will be put on a waiting list and NOT guaranteed stall space and listing in the show catalog.
2. All animals must be on the grounds by 7 p.m. Saturday. The show committee reserves the right to disqualify any exhibitor that does not comply with this rule.
3. **Dairy cows are released at 11 p.m. on Wednesday. Dairy heifers are released at 9 p.m. on Friday. Any animals that leave before this time period will forfeit their premiums for the week.**
4. **SCRATCH FEE:** Each housing (family) unit will be permitted 1 scratch per 5 animals entered. Any additional scratches in excess of the allotted amount will be assessed a \$25 fee that will be subtracted from the premium check. Substitutions will be permitted in place of scratches. If no substitutions are available, the fee will be waived if a letter from a veterinarian is presented at check in for each scratched animal.
5. Registration paper must be in the exhibitor's name and available to show committee when the animal is checked into the show. If the registration paper is not in the exhibitor's name at the time of the show, the animal may be eligible to show if a signed transfer with payment attached and the registry certificate is turned over to management before the show.
6. The exhibitors will be expected to keep their stall space in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all of their equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct. Any exhibitor that is housed on the outside rows of the barn must store excess feed on the outside of the barn.
7. Each animal may only show in one breed class. e.g. Red and White may show in either the Red and White or Holstein classes.
8. A dry cow may be shown in a wet class, but not both classes. To be shown in the dry cow class, an animal must have milked at least 305 days, or have a record already completed as shown on an official DHI form. If it is under 305 days, the record will be terminated on show day. If she is still milking after 305 days, her record can continue. To show as a dry cow, she must be milked out for the show.
9. Do not tie livestock to the show ring bleachers.
10. In order to maintain the educational value of the show, we ask that exhibitors cooperate with the superintendent by accepting stall assignments, exhibiting the animals as directed and keeping the animals clean and attractive.
11. Cattle must be in the ring promptly on call.
12. Premier Exhibitor points will be awarded to the individual housing the animal. Verification will be made from either the CVI or the official DHI sheet.
13. Premier Breeder points will be awarded to the individual whose prefix appears on the registration certificate.
14. Regardless of ownership, Premier Exhibitor points will be awarded to the individual who is housing the animal. Premier Breeder points and Premier Exhibitor points will not be split for the county show.
15. In order to show in Red and White classes, NO black hair may be present on the animal.
16. All class designations must be finalized at check-in. No class changes during the show.
17. Exhibitors must wear white pants. Shirts must have collars. Exhibitors must wear close toed shoes.

Market Livestock Exhibition

- Market livestock must be tagged at the Fall or Spring Tag Day with the official HCJLC ear tag/verified 840 tag.
- Exhibitors must be on time to weigh, show, and sell.
- Market animals must be present at their species weigh-in time. Late arrivals due to extraordinary circumstances will be weighed at the discretion of the livestock superintendents.
- Exhibitors may only weigh, show, and sell a maximum of 4 tagged market animals, including meat pens.
- No reweighs. No replacements.
- Animals not making weight must be removed from the fairgrounds by midnight of weigh-in day.
- Market animals must be shown in the ring and be sold through the Junior Livestock Sale on Friday.

Health and General Rules

Adhere to Animal Health Regulations, Livestock and Dairy General Rules, and the Code of Show Ring Ethics.

Housekeeping

- Exhibitors shall clean or get stall area ready to be cleaned mechanically by 2 p.m. Saturday, the last day of the fair. If the area is not cleaned satisfactorily, \$50 per head will be deducted from the sale check or billed for those exhibiting breeding projects only.
- The fair is not responsible for personal items or equipment left behind.

Substitute Showman Criteria

- Conflict between the exhibitor's livestock show and another fair premium contest on the fairgrounds. Not covered: Non-premium contests or extracurricular activities.
- Sickness or physical injury after arriving at the show preventing the owner from showing his/her own animal. Previous injury or illness prohibiting an exhibitor from showing requires a doctor's excuse.
- Exhibitor has two or more animals in the same class or of different breeds showing at the same time.

Anyone receiving substitute showman permission attending the show while physically capable of showing will be disqualified.

Substitute Showman must:

- Be approved by the species or livestock superintendent.
- Notify the ring man that he/she is not the owner.
- Be another 4-H or FFA member of the same age or younger.

Medication Withdrawal

- Market exhibitors may not exhibit any animal that will still be within the medication withdrawal period on sale day. If upon slaughter a recent treatment with drugs or biologics is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the exhibitor will bear the loss of the carcass.
- Fair personnel reserve the right to blood test animals for illegal use of drugs or antibiotics.
- Medication given fair week must have veterinarian approval and Livestock Superintendents must be notified.
- Animals receiving medication with a withdrawal period beyond sale day must be removed from the fair immediately.

Section 2.1 - 4-H and FFA Dairy Cattle

1. Dairy beef steers must be 100% black and white Holstein or 100% red and white Holstein. Steers must possess four white feet and a white tail switch.
2. Exhibitors are limited to weigh, show and sell one calf.
3. Dairy beef must be castrated by Tag Day and free of testicular development and healed to show at the fair. Castration should be accomplished by either banding or surgical removal. Crimping will not be allowed.
4. All dairy beef must be naturally polled or dehorned.
5. **NEW:** Stalls will be assigned and tagged by the Dairy Beef Superintendents. Animals will be stalled with their club and stalling assignments must be adhered to.

2. All participants will be required to wear show appropriate pants and shoes of their own. Shirts for the contest will be provided by the committee. Participants will need to provide their own long sleeve apparel for rabbit showmanship that has no name, club or chapter name, or logos present on the shirt.
3. All equipment will be provided by the committee for each species. This includes number harnesses.
4. Eligibility: Grand champions can represent only one species. If an exhibitor wins grand champion for more than one species, they will choose which of their awarded grand champion showman titles they will represent, and the reserve grand champion will represent for the other specie(s). Participants will not go beyond grand and reserve grand champion showmen. If the grand champion and reserve grand champion are already participating in the contest and happen to win in additional species, there will be no substitution for these species.
5. There will be a mandatory participant meeting Tuesday evening at 7:30 pm on the porch of the livestock office to go over details of contest and declare species. At this point, participants will declare which species they will be representing officially, after this time they cannot change species representation. Up until this point, they do NOT have to officially declare species representation; no pressuring or heckling of any kind will be tolerated.
6. Qualified and impartial judges that are knowledgeable in all species represented in the premier showmanship contest will be selected. There will be a minimum of two judges each year. All decisions made by the judges are final.
7. Showmen participating will not be allowed to show any animal that is owned by the participant or any animal that is in the same family, housing group, or bed pack as the participant.

- At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- A PA Preferred® logo is not required because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- The PA Preferred® entry and its recipes will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.
- Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2” x 11” sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed with the words “PA Preferred” and then the name of the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker’s brand; or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant’s name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages.
- Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

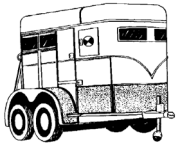
